

## What's the Difference? Present Perfect and Past Simple

Present Perfect Simple	Past Simple
<ul> <li>Unfinished actions that started in the past and continue to the present:</li> <li>I've known Julie for ten years (and I still know her).</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Finished actions:</li> <li>I knew Julie for ten years (but then she moved away and we lost touch).</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>A finished action in someone's life (when the person is still alive: life experience):</li> <li>My brother has been to Mexico three times.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>A finished action in someone's life (when the person is dead):</li> <li>My great-grandmother went to Mexico three times.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>A finished action with a result in the present:</li> <li>I've lost my keys! (The result is that I can't get into my house now).</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>A finished action with no result in the present:</li> <li>I lost my keys yesterday. It was terrible! (Now there is no result. I got new keys yesterday).</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>With an unfinished time word (this week, this month, today):</li> <li>I've seen John this week.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>With a finished time word (last week, last month, yesterday):</li> <li>I saw John last week.</li> </ul>

## **Remember:**

- 1. We use the past simple for past events or actions which have no connection to the present.
- 2. We use the present perfect for actions which started in the past and are still happening now OR for finished actions which have a connection to the present.
- 3. We CAN'T use the present perfect with a finished time word: NOT: I've been to the museum yesterday.
